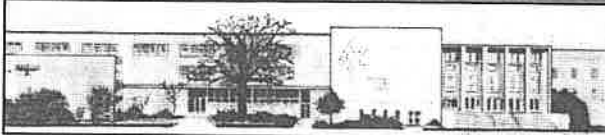

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"We know what we are, but know not what we may be" is the verse spoken by Ophelia in Shakespeare's *Hamlet* about her unknown future. How do we respond to our reality today about what may be in our future? This famous quote was written about 400 years ago. Skipping forward about 400 years to contemporary times, Bob Dylan wrote the folk song entitled "The Times They Are a-Changin'." Today, when we observe our times, we know that they are indeed changing and wonder what our future will be.

At Hillcrest we see that these changes are occurring. Our membership is aging and there are not as many children participating in synagogue activities as there were ten or even five years ago. This fact of life is evident throughout the Conservative movement. At every meeting of the Hillcrest Board of Trustees, discussions are ongoing as to the next steps we should take to ensure that our shul will be vibrant and strong for the next few years and beyond.

From Rabbi Kogan

Dear Friends of Hillcrest Jewish Center,

In the Pesach Haggadah we just read about the four sons (four children would be actually more appropriate): the wise child, the wicked child, the simple child and the child that doesn't know how to ask.

Somehow the wicked child is the one that gets most of the attention. Books and articles have been written about the wicked child, fluctuating all the way between damnation and compassion.

Let's review what the wicked child says: "Why do you do all these rituals?" He says "you" as though he's not a part of this. By excluding himself from the rest of us, he's washing away the whole foundation.

As Rabbi Tzvi Freeman in his brilliant article: *The Wicked Son Redeemed - Who invited him, anyway?* shows, the wicked child excludes himself/herself from the community and we still include him/her in the Haggadah. In other words, although the wicked child gives up on us, we don't give up on him/her.

The question, however, is why? Again, paraphrasing Rabbi Tzvi Freeman, we have three matzot on the Pesach Plate, we could have also three children and not four.

The main answer to the question (perhaps the only convincing one) why we don't give up on the wicked child is because he/she is our child. I don't know many parents who give up on their children, perhaps because deep inside each of us, we know our children are not wicked.

The entire journey of the Passover seder can be seen as another opportunity to bring the disengaged children back, to engage them in a meaningful conversation, to help them connect emotionally if not intellectually, and to let them know we love them, and we are never going to give up on them.

The State of Israel is celebrating its first 75 years of existence. Since the Yom Kippur War, 50 years ago, I cannot think of a more challenging time for the State of Israel. Threatened by enemies from outside and by the lack of a cohesive vision from leaders on the inside, Israel struggles to make a case both in the international arena as well as with large numbers in the Jewish world.

And yet, when the disengaged child asks: "What is this land of yours?", when he or she tells us "I want nothing to do with it!", is when we need to redouble our efforts to bring them back, not by selling them a version of Middle East politics they can't or are not willing to listen to, but by reminding them with love and tender care, that Israel belongs to them as well, to all of us, with its challenges and problems, with its injustices and defects, even with occasionally corrupt and racist leaders.

We don't need to have all the answers. As a matter of fact, the only answer we need to have is that we care for each of our children, and we are not giving up on them. Not now, not ever.

Committing ourselves to a reality in which each of our diverse children sits around the table and is part of the conversation, is the best way to celebrate the State of Israel.

TRACTATE AVODAH ZARAH

Plagues-10, Egyptians-0, Israelites-FREE

“In every generation one must look upon himself as if he personally had come out from Egypt ...”

Each *Pesach*, since Ohr Chadash’s beginnings some 15 years ago, our students have been relating the Haggadah’s tale of the liberation of the Jewish people from bondage at the school’s annual Model Seder. This year was no exception, except for the fact that our music teacher, Morah Lynne, was back and able to make the celebration more melodic and *freilich*.

On Sunday, April 2nd, the school day began with a visit from Rabbi Wise of CEHHHB, who told the story of the Haggadah (Haggadah itself means telling or narration), the text from which the Passover Seder is conducted. Rabbi Wise has a vast collection of Haggadot and was able to share with the students several copies of Haggadot he has acquired over the years. The children were fascinated at the artistry used to illustrate the booklets.

At the conclusion of regular classes, the children reconvened in Menchel Hall, where Morah Judy conducted the Seder program. Accompanied by Morah Lynne, the children began the event with the singing of three *Pesach* parodies to the tunes of “The Wheels on the Bus,” “Spoonful of Sugar,” and “If I Only Had a Brain.” In unison, the students recited the order of the Seder, which was followed by the drinking of the first cup of grape juice, the washing of the hands without a blessing, and the eating of the green vegetable (symbolic of spring), which has been dipped in salt water (representative of the tears of slavery). Our Chaverim class led the Hebrew reading of the Four Questions, while Philip of Kochavim read the English translation.

After the responses to the questions, the ten plagues were enumerated, which was followed by the chanting of several choruses of *Dayenu*. The students then fulfilled the Seder obligation of detailing the importance of the Passover Offering, the Matzah, and the Bitter Herbs. Before partaking of the matzah and the maror, the children drank the second cup of grape juice and then washed their hands, this time accompanied by a blessing.

After eating the matzah, the bitter herbs and the *charoset*, and then the Hillel sandwich, everyone’s appetite was whetted, and they were ready for the celebratory meal. Since gefilte fish had been a “hard sell” in years past, this Seder the main course

consisted of potato kugel and apple kugel, which were more happily received by the student body.

While eating, the diners were able to watch several videos about the Passover story, which included a telling of the Exodus to the tune of the *Gilligan’s Island* theme song.

Instead of the afikomen for dessert, the students topped off the meal with chocolate macaroons. They concluded the Seder with *Birkat Hamazon*, the last two cups of juice, and “Next Year in Jerusalem.”

Still filled with the musical spirit, Zachary and Morah Lynne led the assemblage in all 13 stanzas of “Who Knows One.” Finishing off the program was another parody, to the tune of “My Favorite Things.”

Then came the hunt for the afikomen. The children left no tablecloth unturned and no corner of Menchel Hall unexplored as they sought the six afikomens, which were redeemed for Passover chocolate prizes.

Much appreciation goes out to Morah Judy, Morah Marina, Morah Lynne, and Arlene Ratzabi of the Ohr Chadash School Board, who helped assure that the morning’s activities flowed easily and the students were able to glean the importance of the commemoration. Thank you to Rabbi Wise for helping to put the students into a positive *Pesach* frame of mind and finally to Richie, CEHHHB’s custodian extraordinaire, who assures that our programs come off without a hitch.

As the year winds down, this is just a reminder that all families are invited to our Lag B’Omer BBQ on Sunday, May 7th, where you can register your children for the upcoming 2023-2024 school year.
