Dear Friends of Hillcrest Jewish Center,

On November 9th, we commemorated at Hillcrest Jewish Center a new anniversary of Kristallnacht. Over 100 participants gathered to learn about the Witness Project, a project spearheaded by UJA that brings together high school students and Holocaust survivors to preserve the memory of the Holocaust and support survivors through the therapeutic recounting of their experiences.

All those present had the opportunity to become witnesses ourselves of the atrocities committed by the Nazis and their collaborators during the Shoah, through a moving film, narrating the life experience of five holocaust survivors, including our own Bertha Strauss. Bertha, who came accompanied by her family (4 generations of Straussses were present), was witness herself to the love, appreciation, and admiration of her friends and fellow congregants at Hillcrest Jewish Center, who came out not only to commemorate Kristallnacht, but to honor and celebrate Bertha.

One of the highlights of the afternoon was the presence of Dylan Reisberg, one of the high school students who worked with Bertha on the Witness Project. Dylan shared a beautiful poem she wrote about Bertha.

A big yashar koach goes to the Adult Education Committee of Hillcrest Jewish Center and to Kathy Lewis for putting together the event, to Carol Greenberg for her meaningful words, to everyone who attended the event, and especially to Bertha, who continues to inspire us all.

The mission of Operation Benjamin is to identify Jewish soldiers who were mistakenly buried under Latin Crosses and replace their headstones with a Star of David. This noble work has taken Operation Benjamin on fascinating and often mysterious journeys around the world, where they uncover forgotten stories of Jewish soldiers and piece together the past in ways that bring closure to both history and families. These remarkable efforts have allowed Operation Benjamin to bridge the gap between the past and the present, walking through archives, cemeteries, and battlefields in the pursuit of long-lost truths. The work is a true *chesed shel emet* – a true loving-kindness or an act of kindness that cannot be repaid.

Laurie Bilger has worked with Operation Benjamin for the past several years. Her activities include arranging the logistics for Operation Benjamin missions to American military cemeteries; training students who assist with genealogical research; and communicating with Operation Benjamin families and outside organizations who seek to learn more about their important work.

A light breakfast will be served at 10:00 AM followed by the presentation at 10:30. This event is free to Hillcrest members. The fee for non-members is \$5.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Shalom everyone. Here are some highlights from our October meeting.

Executive Committee Report:

Review of High Holidays services: Services were well timed, page numbers announced, honors managed well.

Friendship Kiddush pricing policy for multiple sponsors: A motion was made and passed based on the Executive Committee's recommendation that the cost of sponsorship for a friendship kiddush will continue to be \$500. If it is co-sponsored, there will be a minimum fee of \$100 per sponsor if there are more than 5 sponsors.

Shabbat volunteers needed: Weekly Shabbat volunteers will be solicited to assist with security and greet people close to the entrance. Half-hour shifts will be determined by an electronic form allowing all members to sign up for a slot. If you are interested, speak to President Helene Jacob.

Kol Nidre Campaign 2025: \$154,500 has been pledged so far. Thank you to all who have contributed and yasher koach to those who have been able to increase their contribution.

High Holiday Ticket Sales: 249 in sanctuary, 42 in ballroom

Repairs to flooring/removal of carpet have been, and will continue to be done by the maintenance staff in offices and the Cantor's residence in order to reduce allergens.

Our maintenance staff members are busy making repairs in line with Local Laws. Roof repairs are needed.

Security is usually not present on Sundays. A motion was made and passed to include security for morning and evening minyan. The additional cost will be \$10,000+ per year.

Sisterhood Report: October 27th will be the paid-up membership luncheon with Cantor Rachel. November 17th will be a light lunch with the program "Empowering Women." On December 8th the program will be "Protecting Ourselves: understanding and preventing elder fraud." There will be a light lunch.

Men's Club Report: Pizza in the Sukkah and a movie were held on October 9th.

Youth and Family Report:

There will be a dinner for teens and Jr. Congregation Nov. 7th. Teen Kesher was cancelled on October 12th due to bad weather. The next meetings will be November 2nd and December 7th with a new leader, Yaffa Reichwald. We visited the Queens County Farm Museum for the Maize Maze on October 19th and 15 people attended. "Shabbos in box" is coming up for Thanksgiving.

All children's services are in full swing. Some new children are attending and one of those families has joined. High holiday youth services and the Simchat Torah party were well attended. Youth and Family is inquiring about using the Youth Room upstairs.

Old Business:

High Holiday streaming report: Kol Nidre/Yom Kippur 42 people attended via computer.

Sale of the building update: Lawyers have made progress; comments and corrections have been received, and the committee has looked at them with suggestions made. Our lawyer will send this to their lawyer to inspect. An accounting of the legal fees spent was reported to the board.

UJA Re-connect Grant (Shabbat dinner 10/24).

Cantor Rachel is preparing a special musical program. As of our meeting, 79 people have already signed up and \$1,000 in sponsorships have been pledged. This program will continue sporadically throughout the year.

Non-member Participation Committee update: The committee met and came up with a fee schedule for non-members of \$180 per year for the Rabbi's and Cantor's classes and for small groups, \$100 per year. Pickleball fees will remain the same. A motion was made and passed to accept the committee's recommendation.

New Business:

Cantor Rachel's Installation and Concert will be held in the spring rather than in November. A committee is forming that will be chaired by Debbie and Mark Solkoff.

There was a concern about food brought in by people from the Summit School. It has been determined that a non-Jew bringing in non-kosher food is ok.

There will be a Kristallnacht presentation on Sunday, November 9 at 4:30 pm. entitled The Witness Project "Passing the Torch to the Next Generation."

Good and Welfare: Silvia Kogan appreciated the concern, food during shiva. The board retreat was a positive experience for all who attended. Early voting begins Saturday; check all the proposals on back of ballot. Thank you to Helene and Harold for the refreshments. Happy birthday Helene.

IRA CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

The Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) has been permanently extended. This allows IRA owners and beneficiaries over age 70 to tell their IRA institutions to make a specific dollar amount payment directly to the charities of their choice. This applies to traditional and Roth IRAs.

This is very important! The QCD must be made directly from the IRA to the charitable organization. Any qualified charity is permitted, but does not include donor advised funds, a supporting organization, a private foundation, or a split interest charitable trust.

The QCD amount will not be included in the taxpayer's income and is not deductible on the taxpayer's return. It does lower the adjusted gross income on your tax return.

The QCD will count toward the IRA owner's required minimum distribution from his IRA. It is limited to \$100,000 per year, and husband and wife are treated as separate entities.
